Thanks to the latest in regenerative science, glowy, younger-looking skin is close at hand



A chieving skincare goals can have the aura of an elusive, mythical quest—just think about the way we talk about "holy grail" products and transformative, age-defying effects. But the truth (and happy news)? It's not so mysterious or magical—it's science, powered by state-of-the-art ingredients and innovations from the beauty world's most brilliant minds.

Take, for example, the luxury skincare brand Lancôme, which has a collection based upon 40 years of advanced research in regenerative science. One of its latest formulas, the Rénergie H.C.F. Triple Serum offers a trio of serums together in one smartly packaged concentrate (they pump out separately, to be freshly mixed in your palm): hyaluronic acid, vitamin C plus niacinamide, and ferulic acid.

The serum became Canada's top skincare launch basically as soon as it hit store shelves, and now it's getting an equally

genius companion: the new Rénergie H.P.N. 300-Peptide Cream. Designed to encourage skin regeneration and tackle wrinkles, firmness and uneven skin tone, the cream stars hyaluronic acid (the mega hydrator), peptides obtained from biotech and green science (a whooping 300 types of peptides—hence the cream's name) and niacinamide, a.k.a. vitamin B3 (the glow enhancer).

Like its sister product, the packaging for the peptide cream is clever, too: The reusable glass jar (made of 30 per cent recycled glass) is the very first refillable product in the Rénergie line, and the mindful design is part of Lancôme's larger vision for sustainable products. (Bonus: Consumers can also save money by reusing their jar.)

To put the power duo to the test, The Kit teamed up with three Canadian beauty experts to try out the innovations and share their stories.



What are your main skin concerns and major goals?

"Now that I am in my 60s, *mio dio*, I am very in tune with maintaining the firmness in my face and neck. My goal is to slow down the process, and age gracefully without relying on fillers to over-plump and other alien ingredients. I always pay special attention to the ethos of the brand I'm buying into and the ingredients of any product I take into my routine. Keeping my skin's elasticity, brightness and even tone is all equally important."

What was your first impression of the new Lancôme Rénergie H.P.N. 300-Peptide Cream?

"The first thing I noticed was how quickly it absorbed, which I love...my skin just lapped it up. I'm loving the hyaluronic acid in

State of the art

Art is always evolving, and here in Canada, our artists are innovating with it. They take old forms and make them new again. They take soft materials and spin them into strength. They break the boundaries of digital art. And, as it turns out, one cup of coffee can change it all. Here, we showcase four of Canada's brightest art stars—textile artist Amanda McCavour, ceramicist Tamara Solem Al-Issa, painter Victoria Sequeira and digital artist Krista Kim—and share how their unique art is brightening our country's canvas

VICTORIA SEQUEIRA Painter

Victoria Sequeira didn't set out to be a painter. She took fashion business in school, then worked as a social media manager. Then, she lost her job during the pandemic. She'd always yearned to be an artist, but, she says, "I can confidently say that it never dawned on me to sell my art prior to this moment, not only because we're told that it's impossible to feed yourself as an artist but also because I didn't see the value in what I was creating." But slowly, slowly, she built her confidence.

It was, however, a cup of coffee that changed everything. Previously, she'd been doing one-line contour art, but it left her unfulfilled and unsure of how to grow from there. One day, she spilled a cup of coffee all over a painting. "I was able to salvage the piece by filling in all of the lines and that was when the light bulb went off and the adrenaline started to kick in," she says. "Once I got started, I knew I was going to use every ounce of passion and energy within me to make this a career—I got a very small taste of it and wanted to show the little version of myself that her dreams were within reach."

Now, Sequeira's paintings feature big, bold women, abstracts pulsating with a vibrant '70s colour palette of olive, mauve, dusty pink, maroon, burnt orange and seafoam. Sequeira aims to capture the complex and often contradictory aspects of the human condition, she says, a duality: "My work is soft yet still strong, demands some attention without being overbearing." Her most treasured piece? "Surrender," a large painting she completed during an art residency in the French countryside that is a tribute to falling in love. "Opening up your whole heart to receive any and all love can sometimes feel like an act of relinquishing power—as if, in order to experience the expansion of self and ethereal moments of life, we must first be open to the risk of the dark and deep opposite. This piece is a token of that. It

marked the beginning and ending of a lot of feelings, pathways, experiments and questions," she says. It's the only work of hers that she's ever kept; it hangs in her studio.

She's come a long way from that revelatory cup of coffee. "Since then, I've polished up my style and created something that I feel is on track to being more true to who I am," she says. "I think I'll always be in pursuit of that, though."

TAMARA SOLEM AL-ISSA Ceramicist

During university, pottery offered Tamara Solem Al-Issa a refuge from the drudgery of student life: shift-work, university exams. Most students graduate and immediately trudge off to office jobs, soul-sucking entrylevel positions, maybe a year of travel if they're lucky. Al-Issa took a leap of faith.

"I studied at the University of Toronto with pottery as a hobby, then once I graduated, I dove right into opening a studio and pursuing pottery full-time," she says. "I sculpt full-time now, which is exactly as hard as it seems in a city like Toronto, but I can't possibly see myself doing anything else."

She started off teaching pottery, but the pandemic put a stop to that. So she started working on her own pieces...and people wanted to collect them. (They also wanted to follow her practice on Instagram: She has more than 33,000 followers.) "I think that sort of interest was a product of isolation," she says. "We had no choice but to make our lives, our homes, our sanctuaries beautiful. It just all fell into place around that time."

Al-Issa is inspired by everything from architecture and home textures to the colours of the Southwest Asian and North African region and childhood memories of her environments. The Red Sea in her homeland of Saudi Arabia, for example, directly inspired the depth of blue used in "Deep Blue," her latest collection. "I like playing with the juxtaposition of hand-built ancient forms containing modern elements," she says. The collection is striking, the startlingly bright Klein blue popping against the beautiful ancient-looking jugs and urns.

"It's a very meaningful practice to me because in both sides of my culture—the Philippines and Syria—pottery is crucial to not only design, but to daily lives in order to store food and water. I like to keep this tradition alive by using ancient techniques and making traditional shapes." She has also branched out into more modern forms as well, ceramics that swirl and squiggle. "After making hundreds of vases, the techniques that I have been developing have finally become autonomic, which means that I can and have moved onto more amorphous shapes that require more precision compared to classic builds," she says. Now, after mastering

> earth, she's moving onto another element: light. She's been working on plaster light fixtures, including an imposing eight-foot-tall model. "Basically I'm planning on just building off of all of the successful experiments that I created earlier this year," she says. "I am very much in a stage of fixation and perfecting previous builds! [My studio's] tall ceilings are constantly encouraging me to build taller—and that no project is too big."

AMANDA McCAVOUR Textile artist

For as long as textile artist Amanda McCavour can remember, she's been drawing and crafting things out of paper, glitter, glue, plastic beads and string. "It continues to interest me that folding and cutting paper can transform a blank sheet into a snowflake or that knotting embroidery floss can create a patterned bracelet," she says. "It is these slight shifts in materials that still drives me to make work."

McCavour is known for her eye-popping, large-scale installations of "thread drawings," filling rooms with dozens, hundreds of delicate embroidery flowers or objects or geometric shapes, dancing from the ceiling. "I like thread's fine nature," she says. "Creating images and installations out of embroidered parts allows me to create ephemeral and transparent pieces that are both in a space but also seemingly on the verge of not being there."

Working with thread offers up a tantalizing web of connections and symbolism: An embroidered image might conjure up a beloved memory of touching something soft or remind one of covering up the body or cleaning up messes, or inspire reflection on the contrast between how delicate it looks and how strong the embroidery really is. "By sewing into fabric that dissolves in water, I can build up stitched lines on a temporary surface. The crossing threads create strength so that when the fabric is dissolved, the thread drawing can hold together without a base," she says. "With only the thread remaining, these images appear as though they would be easily unraveled and seemingly on the verge of falling apart, despite the work's raveled strength. I am interested in thread's assumed vulnerability, its ability to unravel, and its strength when it is sewn together." Installation visitors are invited to walk through paths that she creates in the work, but they're also invited to lie underneath the pieces and look up at them. She likes when people have options for interacting with the pieces in different ways, whether it's through movement or a different perspective on the floor. Visitors are often compelled to interact with the pieces, blowing on the embroideries, so they move with the air, spinning as people walk around them. "I want my works to bring visitors into a playful, imaginative, dream-like space filled with line,

colour and texture," she says.

Lately, she has been very into flowers—in nature, in botany books and in embroidered floral samplers leading to popular installations like "Floating Garden" and "Poppies," along with the multi-year effort "Ode to a Prairie" for the Chazen Museum of Art. The latter required brainstorming new techniques to render 3-D objects in thread and was her biggest installation to date; her efforts were rewarded with a David Suzuki Rewilding Art Prize. "The role [textile art] might play is one of expanding and broadening the boundaries between art, craft and design," she says. "It seems to be that the possibilities for fibre are endless."

KRISTA KIM Digital artist

In 2021, digital artist Krista Kim sold a house for \$650,000. A little low for the Toronto market, you say? Not bad, though, when you consider that the house doesn't even exist in real life. That's right: Kim's Mars House was the first virtual house NFT, designed via video-game software Unreal Engine (and later displayed at the famed Hermitage State Museum). This is just one of many coups Kim has experienced over the past couple of years as founder of the techism movement (which champions technological innovation as art) and 0studio.ai, a metaverse innovation lab. Others include Lanvin asking her to collaborate on its Fall/Winter collection and many other high-profile brand collabs, from creating— alongside Steve Aoki—the first Lamborghini NFT to being chosen by Louis Vuitton as a #Louis200 visionary in celebration of Louis's 200th birthday.

"I would describe my art as 'digital Zen.' It is an exploration of light, colour and form to create meditative immersive experiences in the digital realm," Kim says. "What makes my art unique is the integration of technology and spirituality. I aim to create immersive experiences that evoke a sense of serenity and transcendence." Inspired by the interplay of light and color in nature, the emotional resonance of certain memories or even the transformative power of spiritual experiences, she usually creates her art at home on her laptop—right after she meditates in her favourite chair. "These inspirations manifest in my work through the use of vibrant hues, dynamic compositions and a focus on the ethereal qualities of light," she says.

The beauty of these digital creations is that they are so versatile: They can be intimate and small or blow up to majestic proportions. In 2021, she produced "Continuum," a takeover of 96 screens in Times Square that was an invitation to visitors to pause, breathe and immerse themselves in the transformative power of art, according to Kim. "As the screens synchronized in perfect harmony, they became windows into a world of tranquility and introspection. The vibrant digital brushstrokes and cascading waves of color washed over the viewers, guiding them into a state of serenity amidst the chaos," she says. "Each screen became a portal into a meditative realm, where time slowed down and the mind

found solace in the mesmerizing symphony of light and motion."

While some artists are leery of how AI can affect making art, Kim is filled with wonder and excitement at all the opportunity that lies ahead. "The greatest leap forward in terms of my technique in the past year or two has been the exploration of new AI tools and processes. This manifested in my new work through a deeper integration of light and color, as well as the use of advanced digital rendering techniques," she says. "It allowed me to push the boundaries of what is possible in creating immersive digital art experiences."

ahae Song has an easy way of knowing when it's time to put away her paintbrush. "I like to make sense of chaos, and I care about it feeling calm," she says. "That's how I know if the piece is complete."

Song, a multidisciplinary artist from Toronto who grew up in Korea, calls herself a "visual philosopher." It's how she describes her endless curiosity about the big ideas-the meaning of life, the nature of existence, our place in the cosmos—which she translates into pieces that range from large-scale installations to delicate line drawings.

"The act of creating anything for me is the act of pondering life," says Song. "I want to be a catalyst for you to start thinking about the same things.

Healing through art has become a hallmark of Song's creative process. Earlier in her life, though, she resisted practising her gift. In an attempt to please her parents, she took psychology at university. After she fell into a deep depression, she dropped out altogether.

"I went on this whole journey, I lived in Tanzania, doing volunteer work, trying to find my place in the world again," remembers Song. "Then I learned that you can't help others until you help yourself." She came back to Toronto and studied at the Ontario College of Art and Design.

White pants open up a world of creative styling possibilities. Here's how to wear them with confidence

/ith temperatures in the double digits (finally!), warm-weather dressing is top of mind. When it comes to a summer wardrobe, sandals, sundresses and all things linen rank high on the shopping list, but we'd argue the most versatile piece to consider this season is a pair of white pants.

Tellingly, a "chic summer outfits" Google or Pinterest search (just us?), reveals white pants in at least half of the photos. That's because not only does the colour keep us cool while looking crisp, it goes with everything.

For white pant advice, we spoke to on-air style expert and frequent white pants wearer Afiva Francisco. "A straight or looser fit tends to look more flattering and lends a certain nonchalance," she says. "With white you want to look for a heavier weight—anything too flimsy and you will have to contend with bunches and lines."

Francisco recommends investing in an all-season fabric like wool or premium silk crepe for pants that will last for years. If you run warm, go for linen.

Regarding the obvious glitch that comes to mind with white pants-how to keep them clean and bright-Francisco says taking them to the dry cleaner isn't always necessary. "Hot water and line drying is the best combo, and I'll use a wee bit of bleach when necessary."

"Having lost art for a bit, and how much that destroyed me to the point where I don't want to live...it was a gift, I think," she says. "It made me really dedicated when I was given a second chance."

Over time. Song's work has helped others embark on a similar form of self-exploration

"I intentionally make it about healing and growth," says Song. "That comes from within yourself. My work isn't there to whisper a sentence

in your ear that will make everything better, but to create a moment where you feel like you belong. That's something we all need sometimes."

A recent project—a pop-up installation titled "Internal World Explorer"- offers an example of how this philosophy comes to life.

For the piece, Song filled a space with her paintings: striking, mesmerizing monochromatic forms. She also included a meditation room where people could indulge in quiet reflection. "I got to chat with a few people that experienced it," she says. "They were strangers, but they immediately opened up to me, about feeling held, and grounded. There were lots of tears." This is not an uncommon reaction to Song's work.

Perhaps unsurprisingly, death is

something the artist thinks about often.

"It's part of seeing the continuation of life cycles, whether that's psychological death where you allow part of yourself to die for a new person to emerge, or literal death, like losing somebody." she says. "Death is in nature, and it's actually the biggest gift from the earth. Whoever you are, whatever you are, when you die the earth will still take you back, she will still let you enter into her again, and go back through the entire cycle." In this, Song finds beauty and an understanding of where she fits into a universe that is on an eternal timeline.

"All I do is explore the internal landscapes of my being, and you can go on forever," she says. "You find so much in there, and it's such a good journey to just sit, shut the fuck up and explore your own being." Song is also a practitioner of what she calls "emotional alchemy," the artistic equivalent of Nora Ephron's famous dictum that "everything is copy."

"If I went through a painful experience or a discriminatory experience, I always try to see what other perspective I could have on it that would actually add value to my life," she says. "I make it something I can take control of, and let it serve me rather than me serving it."

Song, who immigrated to Canada with her family when she was a teenager, charts her earliest memories of making art to the endless hours she'd spend at her grandmother's house, drawing on the blank banks of flyers. "When I think about home, that's the image that comes to mind," says the artist. "That set my relationship to meandering in my own mind, because I remember it so warmly. You really go for it with eye makeup. What would be your advice to anyone who wants to go bold on the eyes?

"I think the fun thing is it's just makeup. At the end of the day, you can wash it off—it's not permanent. I always encourage people to try small things, like coloured liners. With so many colours in the makeup world right now, it would be doing yourself an injustice if you only used your neutral eyeshadow palette for the rest of your life."

What are your best tips for applying false lashes?

"The number 1 thing that I hear most often is people feel like they can't put them on properly. I really let the adhesive dry for almost a full minute before I apply them to the eye, and the closer you can get them to your lash line, the more blended and believable they'll look. I like to apply mascara before to make sure things are properly coated and then after the lashes are applied, I put on some more to lock everything together. I'd recommend starting off with something more natural, and then you can move your way up from there. Lashes can totally change a look and really enhance your eye and your confidence as well."
